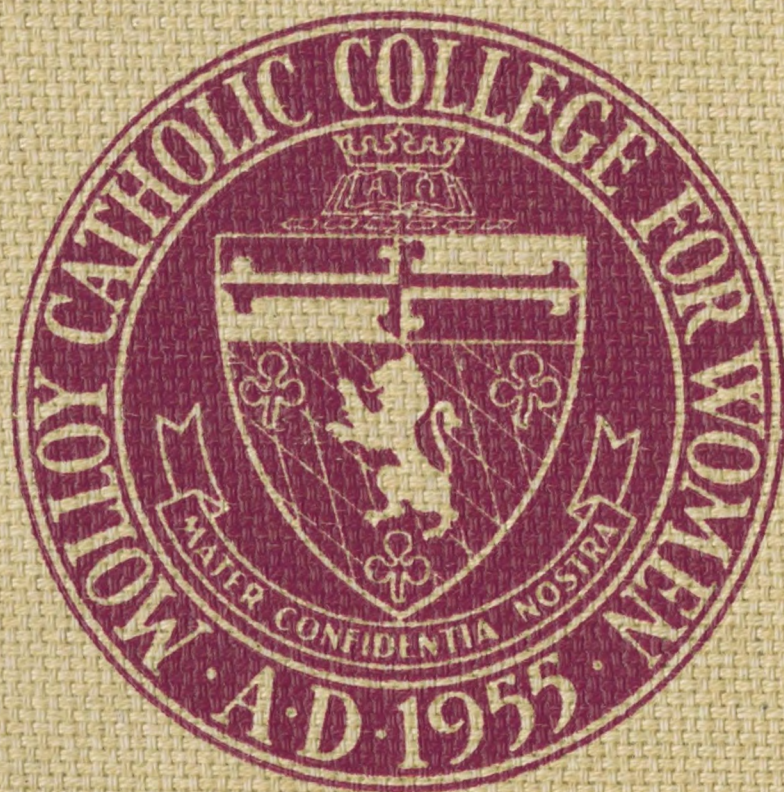



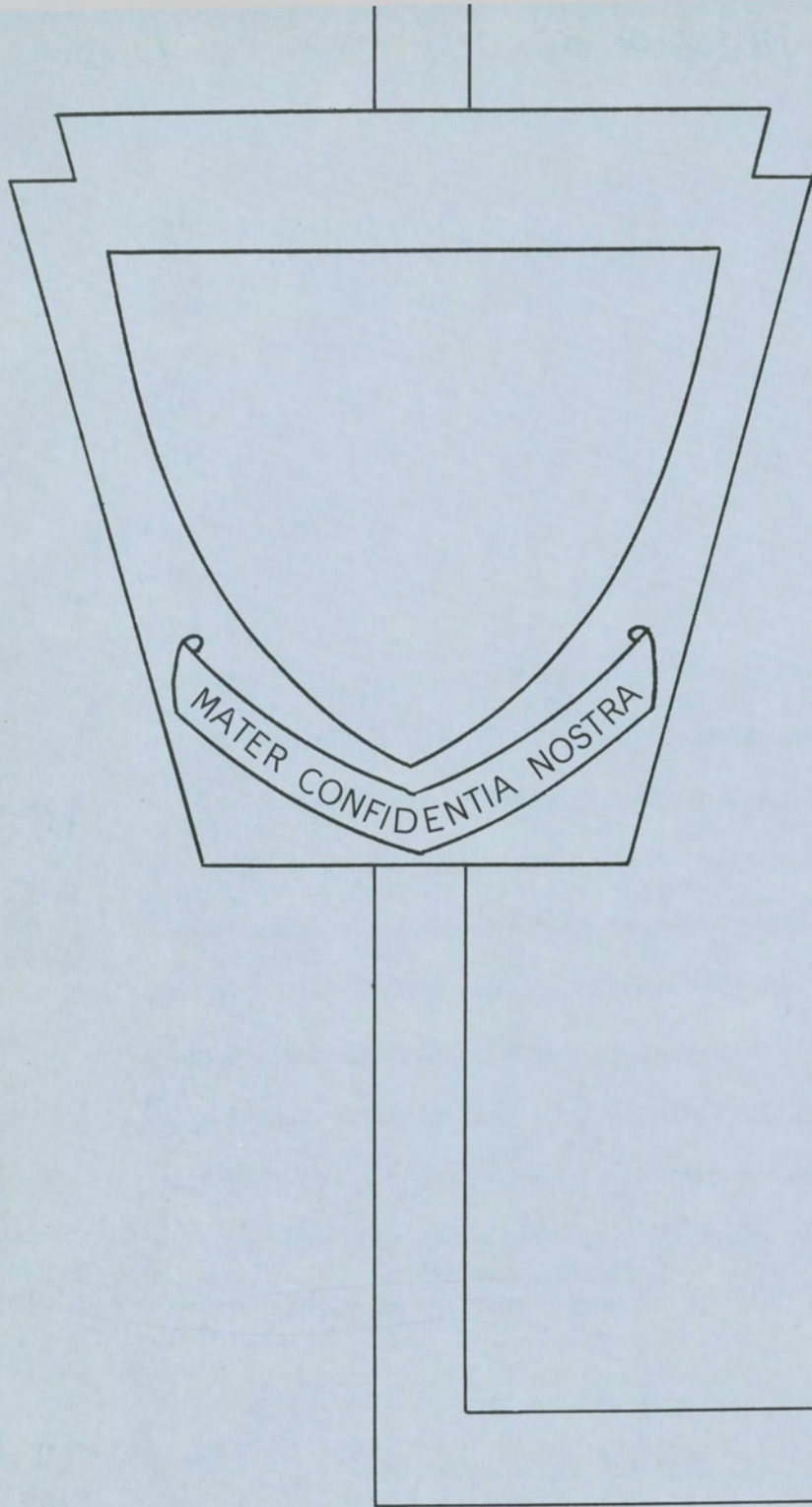




FOREWORD

It is not possible to put into words our sadness at the passing of MOTHER ROSE GERTRUDE. But we can say she was a woman of "firsts" in time and talent. She was a member of the first graduating class of the College of New Rochelle when education at a Catholic women's college was the privilege of a select few. She was the first principal of Dominican Commercial High School, one of the first institutions of its kind in the country. She was the founder and first dean of Molloy College and became its spirit incarnate. In talent she was a rare combination of academic acumen, practical common sense, and human understanding. 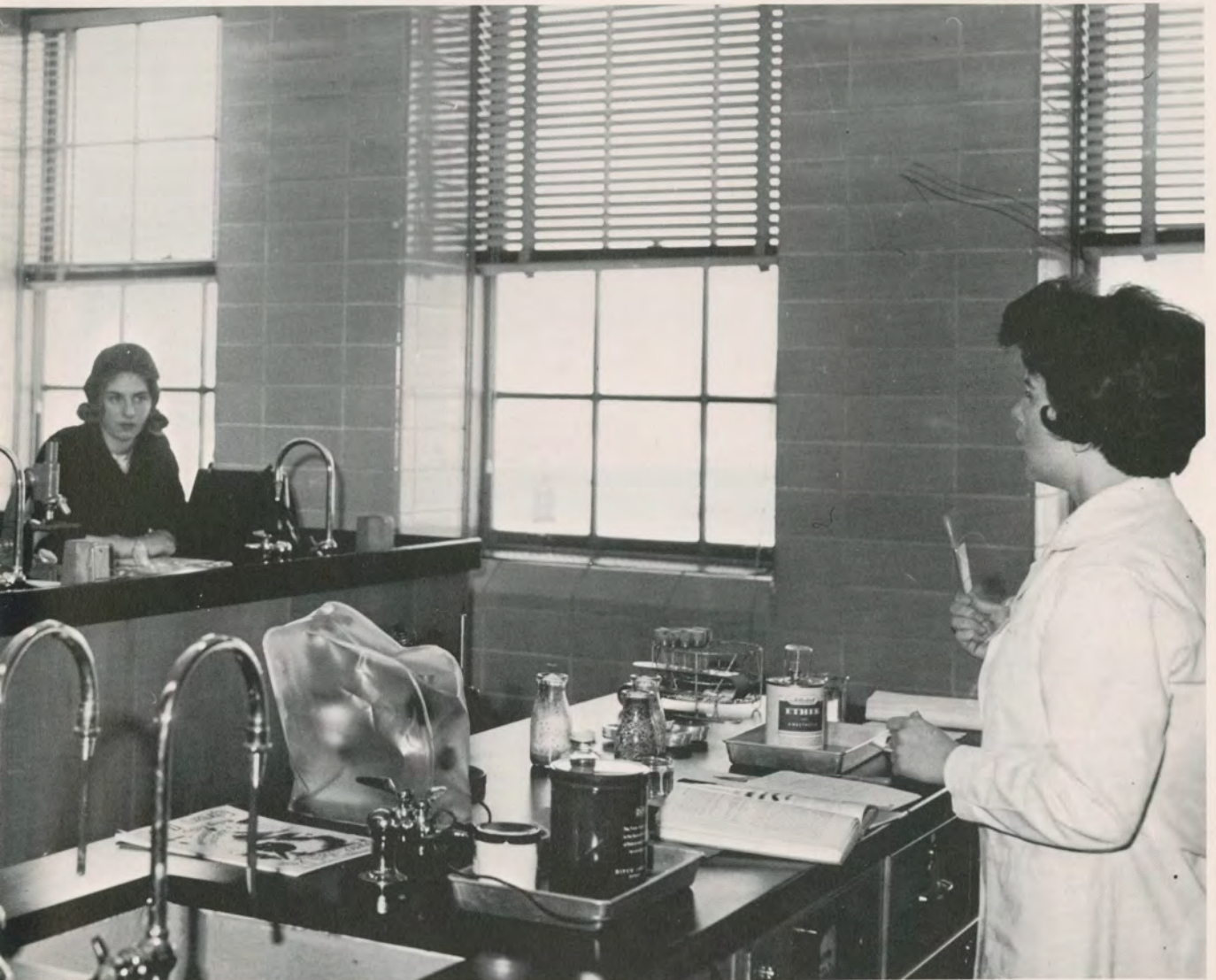

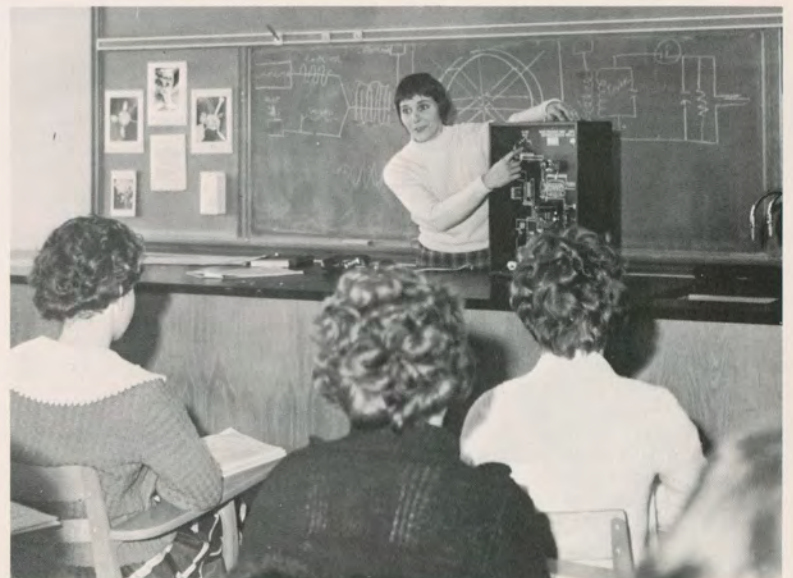

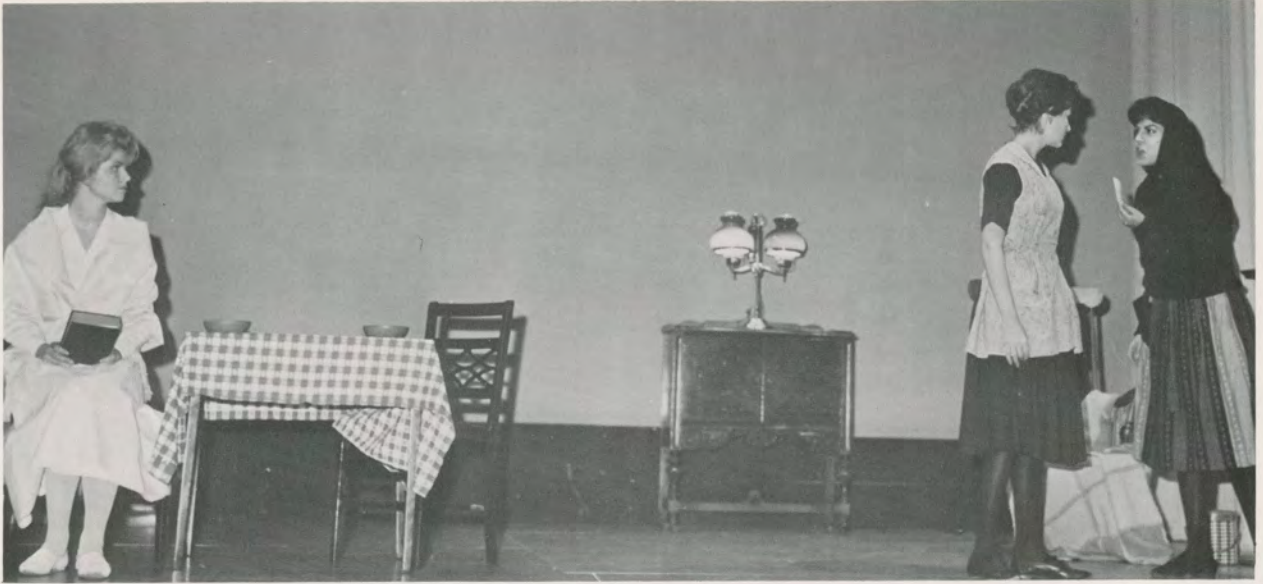

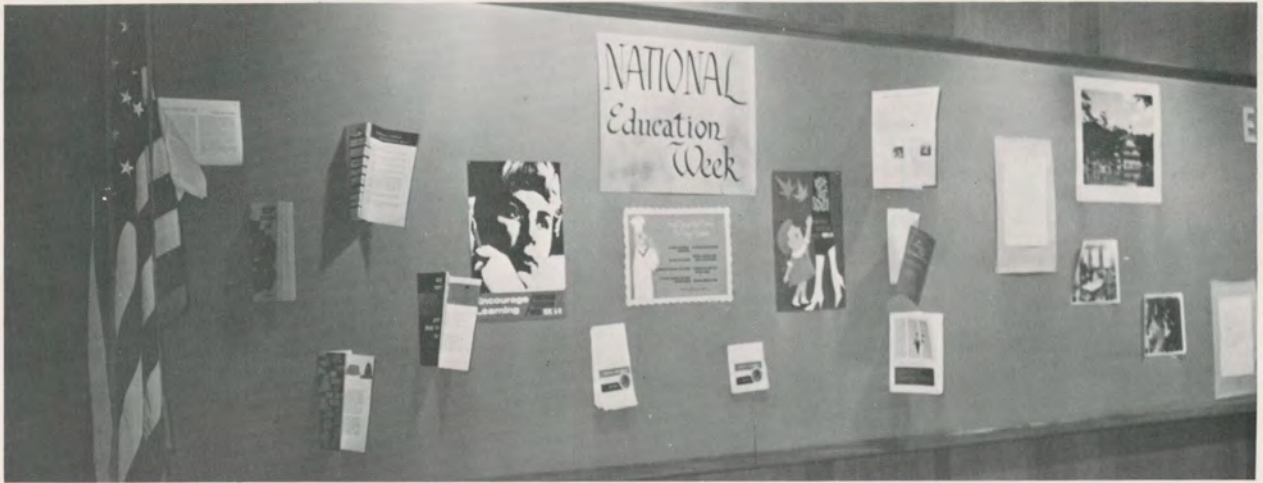

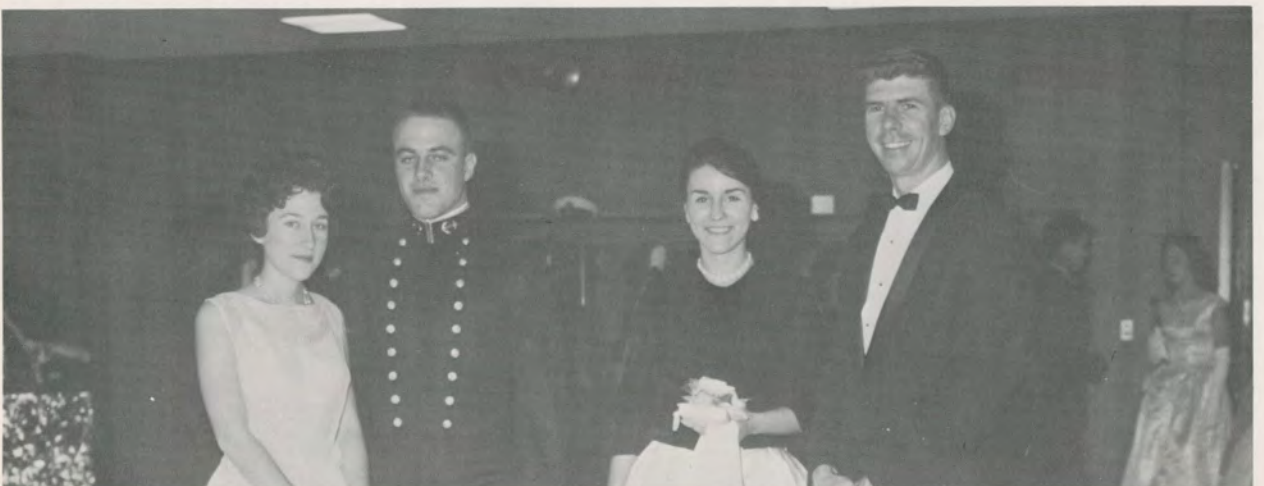
