t Commencement Ceremonies held on May 16, 1998 on the Field more than 500 women and men graduated from Molloy College. Armed with Degrees in Philosophy, Psychology, Art, Social Work, English, Business, Theology, History, Music, Nursing, Biology, Education, Cardio-Respiratory Science, and Gerontology (to name only some), we will spread out to take our places in the greater world. In awarding these degrees, Mollov professors and administration have affirmed that we have met the standards and fulfilled the requirements. We are ready to embark on the next phase of our journey in the careers we've chosen! In two years our century will not only be turning into the next century but also into the New Millennium. This event in history won't happen again for another thousand years. When we look back a thousand years ago we notice a much different world from our own. William the Conquer had yet to cross the English Channel and claim England for his own. Communication was primitive and most of the population was illiterate. When we look back one hundred years, we see a more developed society. The Industrial Revolution had advanced and new technologies were beginning to emerge, such as the telephone and the telegraph. We take the telephone for granted. We've always had it so it's hard to think that society existed without it. Now we feel out of touch if we don't have e-mail or if we aren't connected via the Internet. These "new inventions" have only come on the scene in the last few years, yet they are as commonplace as the telephone. The slogans we are so accustomed to hearing about being connected and the world being a global village aren't just cute sayings, they are the reality in which we now live. What does the New Millennium hold for us? The vastness of possibilities and unequaled potential is unmatched in all of history. How we use what's available to us will determine how historians evaluate us in one hundred years... in one thousand years and it will determine our significant place in history.

Beginnings ... Molloy College

It this moment of great change in our lives, it's a good idea to take a look back to other significant Beginnings. We can get a sense of history and see how we fit into it. In 1955 most of us weren't born, but we have reaped an abundance in knowledge and spirit from the pioneering women of the Sisters of St. Dominic of Amityville. Their foresight and determination founded the Molloy Catholic College for Women. An old mansion on North Village Avenue in Rockville Centre served as the first home of the college and the Sisters who served as faculty. In only one year the first building — Quealy Hall — was built on the present campus site. Quealy Hall was an all-purpose facility. All classes were held there as well as living quarters for the Sisters. Fairly rapidly a second building — Kellenberg Hall - was added in 1958. When Maria Regina Hall was completed in 1964, the Dominican sisters moved into their own convent and Quealy Hall became the gymnasium that we are well acquainted with. We take it all for granted because it was all here when we arrived.

The Adelaide B. Wilbur Arts Center was completed in 1980 and followed in 1983 by the Sacred Heart Chapel. This completed the campus as its founders had originally envisioned it. Expanding programs and increased student enrollment led to the construction of the William J. Casey Center in 1992, its major use to be the nursing center of the College. Quealy Hall athletic facilities were renovated in 1993. It seems that this is not the end: with the purchase of a private home directly across from the College, 1117 Hempstead Avenue, HOPE House became the new home of Campus Ministries. With the additional purchase of 1079 Hempstead Avenue — the new home of the Center for Social and Ethical Concerns (formerly the Philosophy Department) — Molloy College continues to expand its horizons.



Beginnings ... the Dominican Tradition

Molloy is always expanding (not just in buildings) but in seeking to fulfill its mission of providing a value-centered education which enhances intellectual, ethical, spiritual and social development. This is the meaning of Education in the Dominican Tradition.

Every person and organization must be guided by an overriding philosophy, something to refer to in order to understand ourselves and to help us make important decisions for the future. Is there any relevance for us to the only Catholic young women, taught by only Catholic nuns and priests who first attended Molloy Catholic College for Women in 1955? Those first Molloy students — vastly different from Molloy's present student population — attended assemblies in academic attire, wore skirts, nylon hose and pumps, observed first Friday masses and the May and October crowning of Mary. These interesting bits of information tells us a lot about how the College fitted into the culture of that time frame, but what does it tell us about our connection to that Tradition? In order to understand its relevance, we must return to its roots, to a philosophy well over 2000 years old. In the teachings of Jesus, the Christian Church has built upon the foundation of the Judaic tradition of the importance of teaching and learning. It was natural that Jesus' original followers, themselves Jews steeped in the





rabbinical tradition, would write not only of what they witnessed but also about the implications of those events upon the lives of the people in conduct, in morality, in ethical concerns. In the early years of the 13th century Dominic de Guzman, a priest from a small town in Spain, began to gather a small band of men — and women — to live modeling the life of Jesus and His Apostles. Dominic saw them as itinerant preachers, traveling across the land proclaiming the Gospel, "out there" among the people. Dominic understood that it was essential for his followers "to know their faith thoroughly and be able to expound it competently" (Simon Tugwell, O.P.), so as he sent them out to preach, he also sent them to the great universities of Europe to study. They established "houses" for study and training in these cities. Dominic himself traveled and preached. In creating the Order of Preachers (O.P.) in 1216 a salient feature of its structure was its flexibility. "Everything was open to subsequent modifications…" (Tugwell) combining ordered community life with spontaneity. Early constitutions of the Order of Preachers say that novices were to be exhorted to be "always reading something or thinking about something" (Tugwell).


More than one hundred years later a young woman in Siena, Italy, became a follower of Dominic. The woman we know as St. Catherine of Siena was strong and passionate, with a zest for life. She was a woman out of her time, an extraordinary person (a lay person) who in her short life, 1347-1380, influenced other women and men by her holy life. She was sought after as a peacemaker between warring Italian city-states; she was the confidant of Popes. She was a prolific writer: "Keep in mind that each of you has your own vineyard, but this is joined to your neighbors' vineyard without dividing lines, so that you cannot do good or evil for yourself without doing the same for your neighbors." Catherine was a woman on the move in the spirit of St. Dominic.

Students at Molloy College are the true beneficiaries of this great heritage which takes as its motto VERITAS, Truth, and its extension, The Pursuit of Truth. Dr. Martin Snyder, Molloy's President, recently wrote of curiosity and inquiry and activism as distinctive of the Dominican Tradition. We have been exhorted to pursue Truth and Knowledge and to be "out there" among the people actively engaging in continued pursuit of Truth and Knowledge, using what we have learned to better our world and our selves. "In order to be valuable, knowledge of what is going on in the world must lead to a gain in understandng and patience" (Paul A. Karkainen).

With great insight gained from long years of suffering from apartheid, Archbishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa has recently said "...the world is hungry for goodness and it recognizes it when it sees it..."







At Molloy?

There've Been Some Changes...

a **NEW** President for the 21st Century **Dr. Martin D. Snyder** was elected to serve as Molloy's Fifth President. He is the first lay person to lead the College. His four predecessors have been Dominican sisters. He succeeded Dr. Janet Fitzgerald, O.P. who served as President for 24 years. Dr. Snyder is a Professor of Classics who was a Fulbright Fellow and earned his M.A. and Ph.D. from Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C.

Inauguration Ceremonies, held in the Spring of 1997 included a Women of Spirit Symposium with an evening musical program by Musica Sacra conducted by Richard Westenberg; Evening Vespers at the Queen

of the Rosary Motherhouse of the Amityville Dominican Sisters; an Inaugural Mass concelebrated by The Most Reverend John R. McGann, D.D., Bishop of Rockville Centre, with a homily preached by Father Thomas R. Peterson, O.P., Chancellor of Seton Hall University; and the Inauguration Ceremony itself held at St. Agnes Cathedral in Rockville Centre with a reception on the Molloy Campus.

Dr. Snyder's goal is to bring Molloy into the 21st Century, "To connect the intellectual and spiritual values of a Dominican education with the everyday challenges of the world at large is not only an ideal, it is a pressing necessity. Truth must be connected to the lives we lead and the world around us. In the 21st Century, this connection will be vital."

Boxtown

BOXTOWN was first organized in 1996 (and again in 1997) to raise money for Bethany House, a shelter for homeless women and children in Roosevelt. Molloy students and faculty slept out in Cedar Grove in cardboard boxes as a way of showing solidarity with those who are homeless. Dr. Stephan Mayo and Dr. Michael Russo of the Philosophy Department, Dr. Maureen Carey, O.P. of the Sociology and Social Work Department and Meritta Cullinan and Michael Santaniello, both of Sociology, were among the organizers.

This is Dr. Mayo's diary of his first Boxtown experience.

Thursday, October 24, 1996 / 7:00 PM

Helen and Jim begin unloading the seventy-odd box cartons onto Cedar Grove. Paul from Campus Ministry is checking the sound system and arranging his music. I'm taking a turn around the grove and collecting my thoughts. What can go wrong tonight? About eighty volunteers have agreed to spend the night out in a box on the Molloy Campus in solidarity with the homeless in order to raise funds for Bethany House — how many will actually show up?

A news team from Channel 12 is covering the event live - will there be anything to cover? What if there is? What if somebody gets an asthma attack, or has a stroke, or a grand mal seizure and dies in a box on Molloy's campus? That would be news. What if some of the students misbehave — get high — belligerent — fight?! Right now, nothing could be worse than their not showing up.





8:15 PM

For late October, the night is remarkably mild. Janice, Linda, Helen and Jim (Bethany staff) are setting up the soup kitchen. They're all in a bubbly enthusiastic mood.

8:45 PM

It's getting close to nine, and only about five "volunteers" have shown up. I wait.

Then they come — in groups of five and six, armed with blankets, sleeping bags and board games. Immediately they are put to work setting up the boxes, taping them together, arranging them to form primitive communities.

9:10 PM

The Social Work Club places a number of boxes in a wide circle in the center of the field — other circles form around them.

9:25 PM

More "volunteers" come than we have boxes for a few hardy souls offer to sleep "out." Helen counts eighty Boxtown residents — the absentees have been quickly replaced by fresh recruits of the day. I breathe a sigh, realizing that all, barring the mishaps I imagined, was well.



9:30 PM

Sister Maureen gathers all of us "box-dwellers" together for a prayer vigil. As the chorus of a familiar hymn devolves into a cacophonous round, we all line up for candle lighting. By the time Father McCormick finishes his homily, all eighty candles have been lit, and, in the night sky, the twinkling Boxtown "constellation" is indeed lovely to behold!

As prayers alternate with stark facts about homelessness, reports passed quietly through the throng providing updates on the decisive Yankees/Braves game. And then, attention is quickly riveted on the podium as Iris tells us about her experience of living on the subway at only 15, and Lisette speaks of sleeping in the "Back Cave" in Hempstead before her rescue from homelessness.



10:00 PM

We line up for soup. Hunger pangs make the wait difficult, but the taste of rich, hot soup helps us forget how cold we are, and loaves of fresh bread fill the emptiness inside as we settle in, trying to stay warm enough to sleep. The speakers' words are beginning to have an effect on me. Each little discomfort becomes a source of reflection. Waiting 'til 10 PM to eat — what if a meal was not expected? What if the hunger were constant? Each inconvenience became a symbolic token of the experience of homelessness.

But could that experience even be conceptualized? After all, we chose to spend the night outside. What choice do the homeless have?

1:00 AM

As the night wears on, the cold becomes impossible to ignore. The dampness only amplifies our discomfort, and the line for the port-a-potties is growing by the minute. It is 3:00 AM before we attempt to sleep.

Removing my keys from my pocket, I remembered what Lisette had told us about the significance of having them. I went through each to remind myself what was at the receiving end of each — an apartment, an office, a car — and I blessed my luck. Thinking is thanking, said Heidegger. Molloy Security has given me a walkie talkie (for those emergenices I worried about) and now I had to put it somewhere in the box for safe keeping. But where? If I fall asleep, it could





get stolen. It's right out here in the open! It's so vulnerable, and so am I. More symbols. More tokens. Live in a box and you're as vulnerable as a mollusk out of its shell, a shivering hare surrounded by cougars.

I didn't sleep. The ground was hard. My bones ached. Even my skin hurt. Volunteers told me later they got chilled to the bone. Dressed as I was, I wasn't too cold, just sore and exhausted. Driving to work a few days before, I saw a real Boxtown under the overpass on the 96th Street entrance to the FDR Drive — boxes sitting on concrete.

Cloth-lined and newspapered. The next time I passed there, cars had crushed the boxes up against the wall — wrecked.

5:00 AM

I stumble to my feet, visit the port-o-john and meet a Security Guard assigned to protect us during the night. Lisette earlier had said that the presence of police signaled danger — some thug who would drive you out forcefully. Here to me, was a friendly face in the twilight, a guardian. He told me he was called up as an auxiliary to guard the Boxtown "residents." He said he realized that the sprinkling system was due to come on at 3:00 AM in Cedar Grove, and he awakened the maintenance man to shut the system off before we were all soaked — definitely friendly!

At five, I watched the Boxtown community sleep....finally. Mike from the Sociology Department had stayed up until 4:00, talking with the students. But even "Iron Mike" flagged and sought repose. Two selfless volunteeers slept in the open air, having given over boxes to the newcomers. Quietly I watched over

the sleeping township, and contemplated the solidarity and affiliation that should exist between those who face adversity. But Iris had, in her address earlier, reminded me that many of those who are homeless have such a sense of worthlessness that they feel no affiliation, no sense of solidarity, no sense of communality — so much so that they even have trouble asking for help or even of expecting it.

6:00 AM

We survivors stumbled into the cafeteria for hot coffee and a delicious breakfast provided for by Dr. Martin Snyder, President of Molloy, and served by the elegant staff of the Nursing Laboratory. Happy was I that I had a good excuse for appearing before my neatly scrubbed and coiffured colleagues as unshaven, uncombed, rumpled, and unwashed as I was. Another symbol, another token. How can you manage a kempt, clean appearance at work while homeless? a daily challenge for thousands.

BOXTOWN '96 raised \$7,000 and another \$14,000 in '97 for the REST STOP program which is designed to provide emergency housing for women and children who do not qualify for assistance under new, more restrictive guidelines but who are homeless nonetheless.



Melanie Cassidy, a Sociology and Social Work student who participated in **Boxtown '96** said she feels compelled to act after having met some of the families helped by Bethany House. She admits her experience does not qualify her as an expert on homelessness, but she does want to share the benefits of her life with others.

55 Nights, the Senior Banquet, Class Night, the Senior Picnic, and the Graduation Mass all ran very smoothly and were very enjoyable.







The Molloy Community Mourned Faculty President

The entire Molloy community was shocked at the sudden passing of Kathleen Kilkelly, Faculty President of Molloy College, shortly after the inauguration of Molloy's new President, Dr. Martin D. Snyde,r in the spring of 1997. S. Alice Byrnes, O.P., D.A. wrote, "Kathleen never seemed to hesitate. A sense of urgency characterized much of what she did." Mrs. Kilkelly played a central role in the selection of Molloy's new President as well as serving to facilitate a smooth transition in the leadership of the College.

Dr. Martin D. Snyder, President of Molloy, expressed the sentiments of all who knew her when he wrote, "As a professor, President of the Faculty Council, and as a person, she possessed singular gifts and qualities. I feel that I have lost not only a colleague, but a friend."

... and a Great Friend of Molloy

Salvatore A. Milone passed away on July 17, 1997, just two days before his 90th birthday. Mr. Milone will be remembered at Molloy College as the master builder for it was his construction company, Dominick Milone, Inc., that quite literally built the buildings that we know so well. Beginning with Maria Regina Hall in 1963, rebuilding Quealy Hall in 1964, the Grotto, refurbishing the James Tobin Library and the William J. Casey Center: As the College prepared for the construction of the Adelaide B. Wilbur Arts Center in 1979, Mr. Milone personally carried the cornerstone to be blessed by Pope John Paul II when he visited the United States that fall!

The first layperson to serve as Chairman of the Board of Trustees, 1974 to 1985, Mr. Milone also endowed a scholarship, donated the Molloy sign at the entrance to the campus, the handicapped ramp for access to the Anselma Room as well as the statue of the Sacred Heart in the Chapel. For his dedication and zeal the College awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters in 1978.

ne of the first things you notice about Sister Maureen Carey is her smile and you can't help but think, "This is a person who enjoys life." That enjoyment is contagious and it lingers with you after an encounter with her and with her paintings.

Sister Maureen's watercolor landscapes are the link between her times of meditation and her creativity. Over the years her written journals provided that

link, but in more recent years that creativity has found expression in her watercolors. Her paintings are extraordinary. There is a delicacy, a loveliness that makes you want to remain a while longer. Perhaps because they emerged from meditation, they have the effect of making you want to remain still and meditate.

Her interest in art has been with her since early teen years and seems to have blossomed since taking a watercolor workshop. Noticing herself doodling in her journal, she saw that she "was expressing visually what was going on in my mind." Now she says, "I don't know what I'm going to do when I start. Having nothing in my mind is the state I'm in when meditating... I often add written reflec-

tions, poetry or observations which help connect the drawing with the colors I've used and with what has happened in my meditation... this journal... for me, it's a way to be free... meditating provides me with time to simply be and process my life. It enables me to know myself more deeply and opens me up to how God is present in my life and work."

Sister Maureen meditates for about 45 minutes in the morning in the chapel in the convent where she lives. She lights a candle, gets into a comfortable position, closes her eyes and let's go of any distractions. "I can sit in silence with an awareness of the presence of God... It's the way you are with a good friend."



Senior Larry Steimer surpassed the 1,000th career point mark. The Team finished the semester with a record of two wins and three losses.

The Team traveled to Barbados ready for fun and relaxation and The Barbados Shoot-out. The Team won three straight games and captured the Shoot-out Championship. Ready to surge to the top of the N.Y.C.A.C. standings, the Team won six in a row, an eye-popping nine out of eleven! Frank Wassenbergh's steal of the inbound pass set up Dorsey's winning shot. The win earned the Lions a berth in the conference semi-finals, against Adelphi. The Lions fought valiantly, but Adelphi's superior size advantage wore them down. The game was tied, nine minutes remaining, but the Lions just couldn't match their big men.

Thinking the season was over, a surprise invitation to the prestigious E. C. A. C. tournament at S.U.N.Y. at Albany got the adrenaline pumping again. Pitted against the College of Mount St. Rose, and again without the services of Sophomore Eric Schuh as well as Senior Larry Steimer, the Lions fell behind by 18 points in the first half. This exciting evening marked another step forward. We were getting closer.

Nursing Senior Pinning and Mary E. Lilly Night Recognition and MSA Installation came very rapidly after Finals Week. Now our heads were spinning with all the activities we had just been waiting for. They were here and more were coming. Mary E. Lilly Night was an extra special evening because Seniors received special recognition for our four years of involvement in Clubs, Publications, Sports and Student Government. Dr. Snyder served the cake to us this evening and we were quite surprised.

To the Nursing Seniors the Pinning Ceremony was the symbol of their perseverance through Molloy's rigorous nursing program. Those nurses who wear the Molloy College pin — a shield with the Coat of Arms of the Sisters of St. Dominic, the winged staff of Mercury (the messenger of the gods), the Cross (the symbol of our Christian heritage), the Book of Knowledge and the Crown — are known not only for their superior professional care but for their spirit of caring as well.

For the Senior Art Majors, the **Senior Art Exhibit** was the culmination of all their creativity and hard work. Their accomplishments were able to be seen, not just by art students but by the entire Molloy Community. They are the first senior art majors to be privileged to display their art work in the new gallery which opened in the beginning of their senior year on the first floor of Kellenberg Hall. What an honor!

The final Senior Social Events then followed each other, the Senior Banquet, the Senior Picnic and the Senior Boat Cruise. Yes, the Cruise did happen. Not on the original date. Remember those 13 days of rain? According to one Senior "The Thing" was the Senior Banquet. Held at the Chateau Le Mar in Lindenhurst, it signaled the end of that 13 day period of rain. The formal attire seemed a fitting tribute to our four years being completed. There was a wonderful spirit of congeniality among the Seniors and our dates. In this relaxed atmosphere we reflected on what a great year it had been. The table favors were glasses with the Molloy crest. This was a beautiful way to end our four years at Molloy.

Hooding and Class Night, the last of the awards ceremonies, was perhaps the most moving. Departmental achievement awards were given and we received the Hoods designating our degrees and our area of study. Some Seniors were Hooded by family members and faculty who are Molloy alumnae. "In college the people around you want to learn, and you are encouraged by others who want to learn also."


"You can do it if you try."

"College wasn't just young people. It was all ages. And we all learned from each other."


"I know some other students who had very young children. Some others had children in grammar school and junior high. Some had jobs. And they did it."





LIZ MOORE

"My figurative studies are an exploration into the subtle and very beautiful nuances of the human body... It is not my intention to portray the 'obvious' photographic details of the human body, but rather to explore the wonderful palette of colors that is sensed in the human form, or the sensitive line that embraces the form... The twisted, somewhat "uncomfortable" positions, and cropped arrangements reminiscent of the work of Degas..."

BILL KERLS

"I feel that an artist's work is a reflection if the artist himself, in that the artist's thoughts and ideas are manifested in his creations... My current body of work involves the integration of music and visual imagery to create a series of compact disc cover designs... Although the computer is a tool for the artists to utilize, it does not in itself create the work... The creative process involves time, energy, inspiration and imagination as well as a medium and a vision, all of which are used to communicate the artist's message..."

JONATHAN SHIVERS

"The body of work exhibited is an attempt to incorporate modern visual elements into the photographs to create a sense of mystery or surreal ambiguity... Each piece is intended to capture the elegance and granduer of these ancient structures, as well as to covey the awe and to intrigue one feels while viewing them in reality. These places have endured for centuries, yet have a timeless, almost surreal quality. To stand before them is to stand outside of time... "

BETH HEIN

"Through digital manipulation of my own representational black and white photographs, in conjunction with various other realistic reproductions, I am able to construct a new composition... The inspiration for my work is the work of Salvador Dali, Rene Maritte and Max Ernst. However, in contrast to the oil medium, I employ modern technological equipment as a tool to produce surrealistic imagery..."





KEVIN ERBE

"I have created an animation piece through the manipulation of stilllife images and movie clips... The song selected for the piece is entitled Mother Earth, the lyrics speak of the destruction of and disregard for the world in which we live. The visual imagery portrays war, sadness, destruction and the passing of time. Visual components to evoke a sense of repetition of grief, of time moving too quickly or too slowly, of impending disaster, of the 'pages' of our lives turning in vain are carefully composed to create a strong statement, a statement that calls out for attention..."

DANIELLE DELAMORA

"The close and careful inspection of my physical self that is necessary for a somewhat representational portrayal, becomes a personal vehicle to examine more intangible qualities of my personality. It is through this process of self-examination, that the viewer becomes more acquainted with my soul... I utilize found objects, such as windows and mirrors to create a sense of time, growth and experience. The mirrors, candles, and triptych elements have a strong, self-reflective and spiritual connotation..."

LAMIBRYNI MANETTO

"The imagery that I employ in my work is meant to evoke the powerful and sensual qualities of a woman, both physically and emotionally... Since prehistoric times, the female image has been associated with the 'mother earth', with fertility, with inner strength... The use of various metals and glided surfaces are intended to evoke a sense of a Byzantine goddess figure worthy of admiration. At the same time, the goddess is bond and broken by societal restrictions and limitations."
















President Snyder and Father Barr





This day was made by the Lord. Let us rejoice, let us be glad.





-t was a lovely sunny Saturday morning, May 16, 1998. It was a day we will never forget. As the strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" filled the air, signaling the start of this solemn and joyous occasion, we marched to our seats in the tent behind Kellenberg Hall. We were surrounded by good wishes, our families, our friends, our professors and the administrators of Mollov College.

At this, the 40th Commencement Exercises of Molloy College, Father Albert Nolan, O.P., S.T.L., S.T.Lic., a Dominican priest from South Africa, received an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters and Mr. Donald Cairns, M.A., a social studies teacher of Ramapo Senior High School in Spring Valley, New York, was presented with an Honorary Doctor of Laws.

COMMENCEMENT. 661

Mr. Cairns was cited for his example of excellence in course work but more for his example as a human being. In 1986 Mr. Cairns was with a group of students in Leningrad when the disaster at Chernobyl occurred. They were all evacuated back to the United States, but this experience set in motion the creation of the Ramapo Children of Chernobyl Fund which has delivered \$24 million in medical and other supplies and assistance to the people of that region. Ramapo students and Mr. Cairns have continued this assistance over the last ten years. His citation reads in part "In acknowledgement of your work and that of your colleagues, Molloy College confers on Donald W. Cairns, M.A. honoris causa, the HONORARY DOCTOR OF LAWS."

Father Nolan, born into South Africa's deeply divided society, has "traveled the perilous road that leads from the ways things are towards the place where things start to become what they ought to be." His work as a priest, editor, writer, lecturer against apartheid has helped to prepare South Africa's white minority for its present day experience: having a black man elected president of their nation. His citation reads in part "Nothing could be more relevant and more necessary at this moment of crisis in South Africa than the Christian Message of Hope.' For his unwavering hope, Molloy College confers on Father Albert Nolan, O.P., S.T.L., S.T.Lic., honoris causa, this HONORARY DOCTORATE OF HUMANE LETTERS."

Commencement... Webster's Dictionary says it is "the act of beginning." Many of us have anticipated the Commencement Ceremonies, our Graduation from Molloy College, as an end to our studies, a moving up and a moving on to real life. Included of course, is a job in the career we've chosen. But perhaps there is something more, something that Father Albert Nolan, our Commencement speaker, was alluding to when he said that he was glad that in the United States we call this ceremony Commencement "because . . . it should be a beginning, not an end . . . the commencement of something new. . . What begins today," he said, "is your education." We probably thought we misunderstood him because that's what we thought we'd just

finished. Father Nolan went on to explain, "I am suggesting that here at Molloy College you have been laying the foundations for a lifetime of continuing education. Education does not end when you leave college. . . our (Dominican) tradition is one of lifelong learning, where intellectual curiosity becomes a lifelong search for truth." To further explain what he meant, Father Nolan spoke movingly of learning from his experiences as he and others struggled against the system of apartheid in South Africa. "The world became my classroom" and he learned about "real people in real situations of poverty, oppression. . . insulted and humiliated because they were black." Lessons of suffering, self sacrifice and survival are only taught in life.

He encouraged us that as we enter the 21st century the opportunities for excitement in discovery and learning abound in science and technology and in spirituality, theology and in mystery. Scientists are fast coming to consensus in admitting to "unfathomable mysteries" which leads us to serious questions about life, about our humanity and about God. ". . . when we begin to ask ourselves serious questions like these, real education begins."

He exhorted us to "enter upon the exciting journey of exploring these things and reflecting upon them . . . not just following the crowd . . . Molloy has opened your minds to the search for truth . . ." and he encouraged us to keep them open.

With these words ringing in our ears, we, the Candidates for Certificates, Associate Degrees, Baccalaureate Degrees, Master of Science Degrees and Post-Masters Certificates were presented by Sister Patricia Morris and Dean Ceo to Mr. Paul H. Durnan, Chairperson of the Molloy College Board of Trustees for the official Conferral of Degrees.
